Thanks to the Key Biscayne Community Foundation, those who want to improve life on the island have a way to make their philanthropic wishes come true — one good deed at a time.

he world-famous beaches, beautiful neighborhoods, and thriving arts and culture scene are just a few of the qualities that make Key Biscayne such a special place. But at the heart of the island's appeal lies a secret - the generosity of a league of donors and philanthropists committed to improving life in the community. Instrumental to bridging the gap between those good intentions and their realization is the Key Biscayne Community Foundation [KBCF], a public charity that helps donors meet their philanthropic goals from start to finish. "In addition to the philanthropic knowledge we give to our donors, we offer professional investment management and administrative services like accounting, regulatory filings, grant requests and grantmaking. Because we are a public charity, and not a private foundation, our donors receive the maximum tax benefit immediately," explains Executive Director Melissa McCaughan White. The foundation helps donors on a global scale, but it's the focus on the Key Biscayne community that has made many of the area's philanthropists want to work with them.

"I believe in giving locally and affecting globally," says founding member Edgardo De Fortuna. De Fortuna, the president and founder of Fortune International, sits on the KBCF honorary board of directors. He's also an active contributor to life in the community through his work with St. Agnes, St. Stephens and Mt. Sinai. "I want to cause change as directly as possible, and know that my contributions have real and measurable results," he says. For De Fortuna, it's about being in it for the long haul. "Giving back isn't about immediate results — it's about staying engaged and giving continuing support."

Jill Gomez is one example of someone who has seen first-hand how the foundation can help make that long-term strategy possible. Gomez is the director of the Key Biscayne Lighthouse Run, South Florida's oldest 10K race, which donates up to \$10,000 a year to local charities. "The KBCF has taken us under their 501 (c) (3) status, as an agency fund, and has provided the administrative, accounting and financial assistance we desperately needed," says Gomez. "We've been with them for 3 years and it has been a great relationship." It's a bond that has given her more time to focus on what's important: "It's important to give people on and off the Key a wonderful race to run or walk while hopefully motivating them to get out and exercise more."

Part of the foundation's success in helping people like Gomez is the amazing group of people involved. Take, for example, the foundation's chairman, Patrick Dwyer. Dwyer has been with Merrill Lynch for 17 years and is Sr. VP of Investments. He has been named by Barron's as one of the top financial advisors in the U.S. for the last three years. Dwyer and his colleagues on the Board of Directors comprise an impressive "think-tank," and that's a big part of the reason why high-profile donors have come to trust the foundation with efforts that come so close to their hearts.

It doesn't get much more personal for philanthropist Patricia Woodson Weinman, who established a family donor-advised fund through the foundation in honor of her mother, Dicie Cassady Woodson. "My mother was a life-long educator a teacher, college professor, principal, reading specialist and a strong supporter of libraries and literacy programs," says Weinman, a key force behind the creation of the Key Biscayne Community Center and a board member for the City Theater. Weinman and her daughters worked with then-director Anne Roth to select projects and organizations that befitted her mother's memory. "The challenge is to make a difference in this world where the need for inspiration in education is so great," Weinman says. With the help of KBCF, the fund has already helped to establish libraries at St. Christopher's Montessori School and at the Presbyterian School, and has donated to Voices United, a unique music and theater program created by Key Biscayne native Katie Christie.

Weinman isn't the only one the foundation is helping with close-to-the-heart causes. For Alexa Pennell and Theo Holloway, few things are as special — and important — as the preservation of the world's oceans. They wanted their efforts to have a local impact, but found it a true challenge. "Since only national organizations would qualify [as 501 (c) (3)s],

the funds couldn't be appropriated to the local chapters," Theo says. "Fortunately, the KBCF presented the perfect solution because now they provide the investment management, help find qualifying organizations and handle all the administrative responsibilities."

Conchita Caserta, the Sr. VP of the Key Biscayne branch of U.S. Century bank, agrees.
